KUDOS TO THE AAUW-NJ'S AWARDED GRANT WRITING TEAM - THEY MET, DEBATED, & WROTE THE AAUW \$1,000 IMPACT GRANT

When President Sally Goodson asked some of the AAUW-NJ Board members in late April if they could be part of the Impact Grant team, they were as happy as being asked to fill out their tax returns. It is wonderful to be awarded a grant but, writing grants is not a walk in the park. However, we had some experienced grant writers on our team to keep us to the task of filling out all our grant questions concisely and objectively. The team meet at Sally's Home in Hamburg. Our biggest discussion was to decide on what areas had the most impact to AAUW-NJ and our commitment to pursue them if we were awarded grant money. Our final action plan choices were equal pay and human trafficking.

We thought that Human Trafficking was a timely issue that AAUW-

NJ has been addressing for years. We know that New Jersey faces major challenges for controlling sex trafficking due to our proximity to major international ports of entry.

New Jersey anticipates a rise in these Human Trafficking numbers with the attraction of the Super Bowl in February 2014 especially in the Northern region of the state.

The other impact choice was equal pay and this was another issue that AAUW-NJ has rallied for in our state recently.

Our diligent team made the May 1st deadline submission. We waited in anticipation for a notice. AAUW chose to announce the grant awards at the New Orleans Convention. We were so excited to have our name called out we sent our hoorays by email to everyone in AAUW-NJ before we even left New Orleans because we are quicker than a storm.

AAUW-NJ INSPIRES COLLEGE PARTNER STUDENTS TO COACH AAUW PROGRAMS TO A LOCAL HIGH SCHOOL

On April 25th, C/U Partner Georgian Court College student members of WILD (Women in Leadership Development) were inspired by AAUW's programs they wanted to conduct their own program lecture. Karissa Merkel, led a group of students from Lakewood High School in a 1 1/2 hour program on sexual harassment, using AAUW's Crossing the Line and a suggested lesson plan written by Adrienne Lesser, Mt Lakes branch. The WILD women introduced the program using a portion of the AAUW Power Point presentation. The high school students were then broken into groups. Lead by the WILD women they addressed certain discussion questions such as what constituted sexual harassment and what experiences they had with the issue. In the third section of the program, the groups were each charged with devel-

oping a scenario to illustrate sexual harassment, the possible responses and ways to prevent it. Issues that arose included, inappropriate photos on twitter, inappropriate remarks made to students, teasing and spreading rumors in class,

the passing around of sexual explicit photos, inappropriate text messages. The discussions were lively and animated. The high school students clearly enjoyed



the interaction with the college women. Karissa was a wonderful facilitator and she made sure that the girls not only participated but also had fun.

NJ WOMEN'S LOBBY DAY JUNE 20,2013



AAUW -NJ still sees a final hurdle for gender pay equity in the Garden State. On Women's Lobby Day, AAUW-NJ lobbied for their second endorsement of New Jersey's Wage-Gap bills. Their first endorsement was in 2012 (click to see Star Ledger article) when four bills passed the NJ Assembly and Senate; only one was signed into law. On Thursday June 20, 2013, we got to lobby again for these pay equity bills.

AAUW New Jersey was one of the lead sponsors for Women's Lobby Day at the State House along with the League of Women Voters of New Jersey, New Jersey Citizen Action, Planned Parenthood Action Fund of New Jersey and the Women's Political Caucus of New Jersey.

On June 20th these Wage Gap bills were re-introduced to the NJ Assembly and the Senate. One Bill A4044 called "Wage Pay Transparency Act", requires reporting of public contractor employment information. The second Bill A4124, called the "Unfair Wage Recovery Act", provides that unlawful employment practice occurs each time an individual is affected. (This

Bill is a NJ State version of the Federal Lilly Ledbetter "Fair Pay Act"). The two bills aim to eliminate gender-based pay disparities by imposing reporting requirements on state contractors and easing employees' ability to file pay discrimination claims.

On June 20th many AAUW –NJ members stood behind our AAUW-NJ President Sally Goodson. She got to give her rally cry again in a lecture room at Thomas Edison College and on the steps of the State House. She stated "Having one of the four bills signed into law was like being given a large gift-wrapped box with not much in it. The single passed bill became an empty container waiting for substance."


The AAUW-NJ lobby group felt the Women's Lobby Day was a productive one. The A4044 - Wage Transparency Act, passed with 45 Assembly members voting in favor, 26 dissenting and two abstaining. The Assembly also cleared A4124, Unfair Wage Recovery Act, with 50 members approving, 23 voting no and three abstaining. Now it is up to the Sen-

ate Labor Committee to get the Senate version voted and passed by the Senate before it heads to the Governor for his signature.

Kudos to our member **Ed Remsen** who rallied during lobby day on behalf of Planned Parenthood for NJ funding to Women's Healthcare programs. Also, kudos to our member **Susan Williams** a candidate for District 24 Assemblywoman. She also rallied that day for a 2nd campaign on NJ environmental protection issues.

Unfortunately, Kelly's home is in West Creek, one of the hardest hit areas to be destroyed by Sandy. She became one of the many displaced people of the shore area trying to rebuild what was left of their homes and get back into an average American life of proud home ownership. All of her focus and household funds have now been directed to rebuilding their home. NOTES FROM CAROL COHEN'S DC TRIP ON AAUW HISTORY

On Monday, **March 3, 1913**, lawyer Inez Milholl and Boissevain, clad in a white cape and riding a white horse, led the great women's suffrage parade down Pennsylvania Avenue in the nation's capital along with nine bands, four mounted brigades, three heralds, more than 20 floats and more than 5,000 marchers.

AAUW Headquarters helped celebrate this centennial anniversary of the Woman Suffrage Parade and invited all its members to join them with panel discussions and activities throughout the day. AAUW-NJ Program VP Carol Cohen and Susan Buccellato -Freehold **Branch** accepted the invite. Carol had a wonderful day learning not only Women's Suffrage history but AAUW's own history. She was shown the traveling chest that was their portable headquarters location wherever it rested. But the most impressive history she found was the living history of Martha Ann Miller the oldest AAUW member of 102 years.

Martha joined the AAUW in 1944 in Arlington Virginia At 101 years of age Martha Ann Miller wrote her book: The First Century: And Not Ready for the **Rocking Chair Yet** tells her life story of public school activism. She was a shy Hoosier farm girl and an excellent baker at a young age. She parlayed her talent into a free four-year scholarship to college. She credits the Depression Era as

the catalyst to her education and the fulcrum that lifted her up in later life. She worked tirelessly for better education for children in her growing community of Arlington, Virginia. Today those schools are among the best in the nation. As a

Amy found this leadership convention a valuable experience. Here are her own words:

The convention was an amazing experience for me. Not knowing anyone there at first was very intimidating but all the woman were so kind and helpful once I arrived. All the programs and speeches I attended where moving and inspiring. I really didn't want to leave

when it was over. I walked away with new insight in how woman play a role in our country and how important it is to fight for our rights, be advocates for one another, educate ourselves, and mainly- to be yourself no matter what. I am truly blessed to have been awarded this scholarship. I will love to come in during the month of September to meet the AAUW membership. I can share some photos and memories of the experience.

The AAUW organized National Conference for College Women Student Leaders -NCCWSL is a two-and-a-half day conference that focuses on contemporary leadership issues and is designed to help students become good leaders. Besides our AAUW-NJ state funds, many AAUW-NJ Branches participate in the program because, NCCWSL conference scholarship are

the best value for under \$500 and it is given to existing college students. This reassures the branch benefactor that their student recipient is academically gifted and is steadfast on her path to graduation.



AAUW-NJ ATLANTIC COUNTY BRANCH CREATES A STAR FOR DIVERSITY

STAR founder **Gail Zona** tells the story of how SISTERS TOGETHER AGAINST RACISM started:

STAR began in 1996 as a result of an Atlantic County Branch AAUW fundraising event. The program focused on ethnically diverse women and how to improve relations between them and society as a whole. The enthusiasm created that day by the workshops and speakers led many women to say they did not want to see it end. We were blessed with an African-American woman, Laura Hickman, a human relations counselor, who agreed to lead us through the process, gratis, if we were willing to "do the hard work " of finding ourselves as well as creating understanding and respect for all people - racially and otherwise.

We therefore began by stating there would be no barriers to any woman seeking to be a member – regardless of race, finance, vocation, or education. The only requirement is to have a real

interest in reaching personal and collective goals of STAR.

In this process, we went deep within ourselves to find our personal attitudes and relationships with people of different color, ethnicity, religions and circumstances. We then began to see our progress as we proceeded with exercises such as Blue Eyes/Brown Eyes and The Fishbowl. Books read and reviewed covering many topics including Slavery, Civil Rights, Women's Positions in various societies and Religions. STAR has representation of Muslim, Christian and Jewish roots.

Speakers have shared experiences with STAR on subjects of life, religions and the role of women in countries around the world as well as attending seders, Vietnamese New Year celebrations and ethnic musical evenings.

STAR has sponsored trips to New York to see both parts of "Slavery in New York City" exhibits at the New York Historical Museum, visit the African-American Museum in Harlem, Apollo Theater, Cotton Club, exhibits at Seaport Museum and a walking tour of Lower Manhattan. We viewed the building in process at the site of the slave graves that were far from the white population of the 18th and 19th centuries. The Washington, DC trip focused on the Holocaust Museum and the American Indian Museum. Sisters and friends toured sites of the Underground Railroad in Southern New Jersey and have supported and attended many civic, religious and ethnic events for the purpose of personal growth and understanding.

We have diverse representation in STAR and enjoy the feeling of openness that we share as Caucasian, African-American, Latino, Filipino and Vietnamese women. It is our desire to see more women form similar associations to present to our communities and our country the reality of real understanding, respect and civility for all people.

AAUW-NJ Exec. VP Barbara Williamson help coordinate registration for the course. The training Cost was \$100.00,- However,


